- ⁷ but emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, being born in human likeness.


And being found in human form,

The Gospel

Matthew 21: 1-11



Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, ²saying to them, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. ³If anyone says anything to you, just say this, "The Lord needs them." And he will send them immediately. ^{*}, ⁴This took place to fulfil what had been spoken through the prophet, saying, ⁵ 'Tell the daughter of Zion,

Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey,

and on a colt, the foal of a donkey.'

⁶The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; ⁷they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. ⁸A very large crowd* spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. ⁹The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

'Hosanna to the Son of David!

Reflections

knowledge of the future.

5'Let the same mind be in you that was* in Christ Jesus..' (Phil.2:5)

One of the most powerful images given to us today in the Gospel reading, is that of a Christ who sets his face on Jerusalem. No doubt there is a sense of great elation at the welcome he receives, yet, let's not forget that this was the Christ who knew the hearts of all people! Regardless of the welcome, Jesus knew what lay ahead and yet allowed the people (many of whom would turn against him within a matter of days!) to celebrate his entry into Jerusalem. How difficult must this have been for him and how heart-breaking to realise that this seemingly supportive crowd would dissipate completely, leaving him alone to suffer death on the cross.

What we witness in this Gospel story is a complete trust in God. The type of trust that is acknowledged in the First Reading from Isaiah today where the writer portrays not only his openness to the teaching of God in the first instance, every morning, but his willingness to hold fast to that teaching in trust; 'I was not rebellious, I did not turn back or hide my face.. the Lord God helps me.. therefore I have set my face like flint.' Such similarities as Jesus 'sets his face towards Jerusalem' in full

In these days of great uncertainty and solitude for many, it is my prayer that you let these scriptures sit deeply within your understanding. Not only does God promise to be with us in uncertainty, he also requires that we trust in him with our whole heart and 'set our face' upon him in the knowledge that his hand is at work within this and every situation. It is understandable that we question God's presence or plan in the suffering that is taking place at this time and nobody has an answer to this, but at the very least perhaps we can allow ourselves to think of God as 'receiving' rather than 'taking' the souls who die from Covid 19; to place him in the very midst of the suffering because he willingly walked the road to suffering in the person of Jesus Christ and through him, knows the ravages of this earthly world; to turn our attention on the instant replenishment of this world in its own solitude with us all locked away; where rivers fill with fish and skies return to clear blue? Above all, can we truly recognise the face of Christ in the

resilience of this human race; in our need to reconnect with each other in a new way and in a place where there no longer exists all that drew us apart?

Sometimes the type of trust we read about today from the writer of Isaiah and St. Matthew's Gospel requires all that we have within us. Often waiting and sitting still requires more courage than moving forward. And so, 'may the same mind be in you as was in Christ Jesus' who never took his eyes from God in all that lay ahead of him. Such a joyous Psalm for today. Take time to read and inwardly digest and in doing so, open your heart to the peace of God within these words.
