

I like to walk to the garage and back in a loop most mornings. This week the sky above has been remarkable. I always advised my children to never let a day go by without looking upwards! The present glorious weather has provided a magnificent vista of changing cloud upon brilliant blue this week and no better week for this to happen! This coming

Sunday we celebrate Pentecost the coming of the Holy Spirit on Jesus' disciples and the beginning of church as we know it today.



I have always been fascinated by the Holy Spirit who is (to me) a wild and unpredictable thing that can move, manoeuvre and transform in the blink of an eye. This Spirit was first described as $\mathbb{R}uach$ (the Hebrew word for breath or wind). Interestingly, $\mathbb{R}uach$ is a feminine noun that sits perfectly well with the understanding that

she was the Spirit of creation, of life. It was $\mathbb{R}uacN$ that moved across dark waters at the beginning of creation (Gen.1:2) and $\mathbb{R}uacN$ who rested upon the heart and mind of Isaiah (Isa 42:1) and these are to mention only two of the many references to the Spirit in different shapes and forms throughout the Bible.

Understanding the Spirit or $\mathbb{R}uach$ as the breath of God can be a unifying thought. If God breathes life into his creation in its different manifestations, then the question is, can we recognise that life and light of God in each other and does this unifying fact change our thoughts, behaviours and understanding when it comes to the joys and challenges of being part of family, friends and community?

Before Jesus ascended into heaven, he assured his followers that he would not leave them orphaned but would send to them an advocate and guide (the Holy Spirit). What makes this Spirit invincible and a constant in our lives is that it resides *within* us. All we have to do is call upon the Spirit for guidance and wisdom. How long is it since you asked the Spirit to come and guide you? Can you remember a moment in your life when you had that inexplicable experience of the life-giving power of Ruach?

Our entire lives are a spiritual journey of development and there are many challenges along the way. Perhaps these occur in order to jog us out of our ordinary lives and encourage us to grow and flex and learn. Whatever the necessity or outcome, we are accompanied by an invisible yet powerful force within ourselves; Ruach – the breath of God.

I often remind people of the encounter between Fr. Richard Rohr and a Jewish Rabbi many years ago. The Rabbi explained to Richard that the members of the Jewish faith were not allowed to speak the name of God because they were not worthy to do so. Letters were chosen therefore to represent God - YHWH (not spelled Yahweh). In its original form this was not a word but a sound. It was a sound

that did not require a person to move their lips. In short, the original name for God among the Jewish people was a breath. (Inbreath YAH and out-breath WEH). If you think about this, the first word we say when we arrive in this world is God's name — and, of course, it will be our last.

May $\mathbb{R}uac\mathcal{N}$ be upon you and among you and those you love this day and always.
