Reflecting on this week's Gospel as Jesus speaks about the forgiveness God affords us being passed on from ourselves to others, it occurred to me that this could be an almost palpable energy of goodness that could be passed on and I was reminded of something that happened in the not too distant past. During the last heavy

snowstorms we had in Ireland a few years ago, my colleague and I were travelling home on the motorway from Cork. Weather warnings were in place throughout the country and we were returning home from a course earlier than expected. Roads were closing and quieter and there was a sense of evacuation in the air!

You can imagine our initial disbelief and immense gratitude. There was no need to do this but for the good of the individual behind; a small gesture that made big а difference. It's not that we were all the richer for the few euros

saved, it was the feeling of warmth and gratitude that this gesture brought in its wake. We were far more likely to hold on to this feeling and sense and perhaps pass this on from ourselves too in our reactions to something that might occur later on in the day or the week to follow. It was the little story that brought a smile to a listener's face and renewed faith in humankind. Kindness is as catching as laughter and joy. Years later I still recount this story.

SOMETHING SWEET! School Assemblies aren't quite the same at the moment, but there's always a silver lining. Every Friday I go into just one classroom and stand or sit at a required distance from the class. It sounds cold and calculated but it's not. In fact there is a closeness to these little pods these days and I feel that the connection is being made on a slightly deeper level with our school children. For the first two weeks Copperpot has come to reintroduce himself to the Senior Infants and say a first hello to those who have just begun their



school journey. Our focus at present it about settling in new surroundings and how feeling uncomfortable is to be expected. We then look at the plus side to this new norm as closer friendship are being formed.

Copperpot lent himself to being shy and shaky at first in the classroom with Junior and Senior Infants. Having confirmed with the class that it's ok to feel a little uncomfortable at times within yourself, I asked how they might help someone in this predicament to feel a better in themselves. Someone wisely offered 'quietness' as an idea which I complimented no end! Then came another suggestion..."Cake?"

I had to agree, it was quite an excellent solution!


The Living Room is a concept rather than one particular event. It's aim is
