


There are seven members of the LeFanu family laid to rest in this churchyard. William Richard was a famous railway engineer, responsible, among other projects, for the Bagenalstown to Kilkenny line, which included the Borris viaduct. He had 10 children, 8 sons and 2 daughters, many of whom became famous in their own fields.

(One, Rev Henry Frewen, emigrated and became Primate of Australia, in 1935)

William was an active member of the Enniskerry community, a popular figure in the village, and Vestryman for twenty years while resident in Summerhill, now the hotel.

He was the author of a memoir, "Seventy Years of Irish Life", still quoted in anthologies.



His wife, Henrietta Victorine, was the daughter of Sir Matthew Barrington, (of Barrington's Hospital, Limerick.)
Of the sons here buried, Captain Hugh Barrington LeFanu RN, was harbour master of Dunkirk 1915-1918, and subsequently officer in charge of CoastGuards in SE Ireland .(His son, Admiral Sir Michael LeFanu, CB,KCB,GCB 1913-1970, served in WW2 and became First Sea Lord 1968-70)

William Richard LeFanu, 1816 - 1894

Victor Charles LeFanu, JP, 1862-1939, was a classical scholar, and became Lord Meath's Agent. He played rugby for Ireland II times and was captain in 1892.

Yet another son, also William Richard, 1861-1925 a Barrister, was the

administrator of Queen Anne's Bounty, as recorded on his headstone, which was a fund for the relief of impoverished clergy, founded in 1703. And another, Thomas P. d. 1945, was Commissioner of Public Works and the President of the Antiquarian Society of Ireland. Summerhill was a haven for nephews and nieces, children of his brother, Sheridan LeFanu, author of gothic stories. One nephew was a

Sheridan LeFanu, author of gothic stories. One nephew was a Vestryman at Powerscourt for some years. A niece, Eleanor Robertson, and her daughter are also buried in the churchyard.
