The more I am around my own young adults and others I become more heartened; it seems, at first glance, that the world is changing rather rapidly and that there are certain habits, actions or words that are no longer acceptable because of the hurt they might cause to another individual. After centuries of trying and standing on the shoulders of remarkable people in the past, the world is beginning to move forward in areas of equality and justice (although many of us would say – ‘not quick enough’ in certain quarters!). It is good, however, to focus on the positive and cleave to the little

adjustments that bring about immense change. It seems that our younger people seem to have found their voice in this world today and are using it!



This week’s Gospel is about Voice. As we move through the Season of Advent we are encouraged to always ‘watch and wait’ for God in our lives. John is the person who emerges for us during Advent as he is spoken of by the Prophets of old as a ‘voice crying in the wilderness’ another integral piece of the puzzle that had to be in place for the birth, life and ministry of Jesus the Christ. Yet, like most things associated with the Messiah’s

entrance and presence in this world, John is the most unlikely candidate to announce him.

If the Divine within us takes the shape and form of all that is non-material then John excelled in his simplicity, drawing upon deeper truths and exhibiting faith, courage and something undefinable within his person that had people flock to him from Jerusalem. It took tremendous courage for John to stand and declare the Messiah and no doubt there was a strong cohort who declared him insane! Finding a Voice as a follower of Christ can take on many different forms yet, at the end of the day, it is the powerful witness to something that is more than we can comprehend; to a Divine power with the ability to transform an open heart. Advent affords us the opportunity to review our own thoughts about our faith and possibly time too.



Spiritual Advent Calendar


In chapter 9 of Esther, the Jews (who are under law) “*took it on themselves*” (v27) to commemorate annually one of God’s great deliverances of his people. The holiday was to be “*a day of joy and feasting, a day for giving presents to each other*” (v19) and “*gifts to the poor*” (v22), just as “*Queen Esther had decreed for them*” (v31). What’s more, the actual dates were chosen by mere *humans* (see verses 17–22). How much more are Christians, under grace, at liberty to do likewise with key events in the unfolding of God’s great redemptive plan—events such as Jesus’ birth.

Since the Fourth Century the period leading up to December 25th has traditionally been referred to as “Advent” (ie. ‘coming’). In a passage

commonly known as ‘The Magnificat’ (Luke 1:46–55), Mary ascribes no fewer than 27 characteristics to God—each of which, curiously, begins with the letter ‘P’. As we prepare to commemorate Christ’s birth (and indeed prepare for his return in glory!), we would do well to ascribe those same 27 attributes to our heavenly Father. The chart below may help anyone who wishes to focus on a different attribute each day...

In addition, there is recognition that there are those who either cannot or may not wish to attend church in the normal way. Live streaming will continue, and Holy Communion will be provided at home where possible.

Parishes are hugely grateful to all those who provide support in so many ways and are eager to begin the process of a return to being a visible, vibrant and living part of the community.

The challenges that we have all faced and will continue to face are not just liturgical or logistical, but financial too. You have all heard the clarion call from businesses to shop local this Christmas. As you prepare to open your purses to support businesses in your area, we urge you to support your parish too. Traditional methods of fundraising could not take place this year, so please put your parish on your 2020 Christmas present list.



Thomas James Mustard, 1826-1902, was the RIC constable in Enniskerry. RIC officers were able to retire at a relatively young age. On his retirement he became the gatekeeper at the lower end of what we know as the Lovers Leap Path. His cottage has long been demolished, but he and his

wife used to serve teas there at long benches in front of the door to the tourists who visited the Dargle Glen. He raised his large family of 11 children there. His eldest son, also Thomas, was born in the barracks in Enniskerry. When he grew up, he married the daughter of his father's successor at Enniskerry, Anthony Gallagher. (The Gallagher's are also buried in this graveyard) Thus their daughter, Kathleen, has two RIC officers for grandfathers. Kathleen was born in 1912, lived



all her life in Bray, and died in 2016 at the age of 104. She was a delightful companion, with a fund of tales to tell, and it seems incredible that her grandfather was a Victorian who had fought in the Crimea.

The headstone records the death of Thomas Mustard's wife and two of the children, aged 7 and 10, Cecil and Lucy. There are no other names on the stone, but Thomas himself and four other adult members of the family are buried there. Kathleen is buried elsewhere. Perhaps there was no room left in the family plot.

Mothers' Union plays its role through advocacy, prayer and practical matters.




Throughout the year branches support refuges, according to local needs, providing items and vouchers for families that have just arrived to home start packs. The response from members has been phenomenal.
