

This churchyard has a generous supply of bishops and even a few archbishops. It seems to be a favoured spot for them to gather.

The one chosen today is Archbishop John Alan Fitzgerald Gregg CH 1873-1961.

He was born and educated in England into an Irish clerical family, was a prizewinning student of Classics at

Cambridge, began his own ordained ministry as a curate in Ballymena in 1896, and was Incumbent of St Michaels, Cork. His reputation increasing steadily as churchman and leader, he moved up the ranks to Bishop of Ossary in 1915, Archbishop of Dublin in 1920, and then Archbishop of Armagh and Primate of All Ireland from 1939 to 1959.

He presided over the Church of Ireland at a crucial time in Ireland's history. Though conservative and Unionist, he encouraged his flock to come to terms with the political realities of 1922. He was learned, outspoken, pragmatic, a respected church historian and antiquarian; an early advocate of Christian Unity, who also admired the devotion and discipline of the Catholic Church. He was widely known in Britain and the CH designation after his name, stands for Companion of Honour, a title bestowed on him by Queen Elizabeth in 1957, in recognition of his "important and continuous " contributions to religious matters.

Tall and dignified, he was once mistaken for De Valera, and arrested. Also commemorated on the headstone are two sons lost in the Services. John Francis Fitzgerald Gregg worked for the Malayan Civil Service, in the Justice Courts. He became a Flying Officer in the RAF in WW2, was taken prisoner by the Japanese, and was lost at sea in 1943. He was 40. His brother, Claude John Montgomery Gregg, a sub-Lieutenant in the Royal Navy, died in a military hospital in London in 1928, aged 22 A sister, Barbara Fitzgerald was a novelist, writing "We are Besieged", a novel about the havoc experienced by the Protestant community at the creation of the new State.

Archbishop Gregg and his wife, Anna, lie peacefully a few paces from the grave of Donald Caird, Archbishop of Dublin, and Primate of Ireland, 1985-1996, and his wife Nancy.
