William A E West-Erskine and Alfred E West were two of the seven children of the Reverend William James West, Rector of Delgany 1847-59

The elder brother's full title is The Hon. William Alexander Erskine West-Erskine MLC.

Their mother was Elmina Erskine, daughter of William Alexander Erskine of

Co. Fermanagh.

The eldest son, named for his grandfather, took his mother's surname when he inherited her property. He emigrated to Australia in 1861, and took up farming, breeding Hereford cattle. He was best known as a politician and became an MLC (Member of the Legislative Council of South Australia). He was a man of strong opinions, but was, according to an obituary, a loyal and affable friend. He resigned his seat in 1891, and set of on an extended visit to America, and a home trip to Ireland. It is believed that he intended to return to Australia but died while in Ireland in 1892 at the age of 53.

His brother Alfred Edward West (1851-1919) lived at Kilcroney House with his wife, Florence Levey, a Canadian from Quebec, and their children. Florence is also buried here. Alfred served as a Lieutenant in the Wicklow Rifles and was High Sheriff of Wicklow in 1915. On the day of the Easter Rising, he was caught up in the fighting and unable to reach home, his car having been commandeered to transport wounded soldiers. He took refuge in the Kildare Street Club and wrote a description of the days and events as they occurred. These are now in the club Archive, lodged in the National Library. He died in 1919 aged 68.

The Headstone immediately in front of this one, commemorates Alfred's son Cyril Charles West (1878-1953), who was a Lt Colonel in the Black Watch, fought in the Boer War and in WWl. His wife, Ursula May Sealy West, nee Gillman, who died in 1974, is buried with him.

Cyril Charles had a sister, Hazel Valerie West (1881-1954) who became famous in 1922 and known in the press as " The Ulster Admiral" or " The Lady Admiral of Lough Erne". At the she newly time. was 40, divorced, and living on her steam vacht, when she was swept up in the Battle of Belleek, using her ship to transport government soldiers who had been cut off during the fighting. This was not part of the Civil War, but you will



have to look it up, if you are interested, Irish history being somewhat confusing at that period.

To see a fascinating little video of this indomitable woman at the helm, Google Hazel Valerie West, and look for her on the <u>ifiarchiveplayer.ie</u>. I was particularly charmed with the washing line on the yacht where an array of Irish linen tea towels flapped in the breeze.

Hazel Valerie was married to Colonel Herbert Curling Laverton, OBE of the Black Watch, and later to Augustus West, possibly a relative. Col Laverton was a friend of Mervyn Richard, 8th Viscount Powerscourt, and a touching memorial stone was erected by him to his friend in the Killing Hollow valley just below the Pepperpot Tower in Powerscourt

Gardens. The wording is surely significant, but we can only guess at Laverton's work in the Valley.
