# Rectors Wish List

Beatrice McMullen (nee Carnegie) 1823-1887, was the sister of John D Carnegie who featured in the headstone series last week. She married John Franklin McMullen (1820-1897), who was also an employee of the National Bank of Ireland. In the 1960s, her brother, John Carnegie, was offered a senior post in Australia, but he turned it down because his wife's family thought she might not be strong enough to survive the long

voyage. The post was then offered to his brother-in-law John McMullen.

The couple sailed to Australia, where John was employed as Inspector and General Manager of the Union Bank of Australia.

In St Kilda, a suburb of Melbourne, he built a fine two-story house in Victorian Regency style, where the family lived for some years, as well as supervising the building of new branches of the bank different in areas of Western Australia. His home has been demolished. to make way for modern development decades ago, but some of the bank houses survive as heritage buildings still in use.



The family returned eventually to live in Ireland. John Franklin McMullen's graveslab lies beside that of his wife Beatrice.

On either side of these, are the memorials to their two daughters, Adelaide, who died in 1954, and Amelia, who died in 1929.

Amelia was an author and poet, who wrote under her Millie married name. Smythe. Stewart She married an Australian surgeon, James Stewart Smythe, and when he died unexpectedly in a hotel in Kingstown (Dun Laoghaire), he buried in Deans Grange 1907 Millie insistent that he be buried in Powerscourt Graveyard and had him exhumed and reburied here in 1911, which is unusual, I would have



thought. His beautiful stone is decorated with raised metal lettering, and a verse from one of her poems.

Until a few years ago, there were also two bronze cameos of the pair fixed to the slab. You can still see where they were set. These have been stolen by some vandal, who prised them from their setting, and there is no way they can be traced.

I think these headstones are the last of the Whelan/ Carnegie connection.

When the Reverend Ernest was buried in 1910, his friend, the Reverend William Foster Boyle of Bushy Park gave a funeral speech which is printed in booklet form. I quote:

"(Ernest) began his ministry here in Powerscourt, and from this parish he went to Kilbride, where for twenty-seven years his life work lay. Thus, within the circle of those Wicklow hills he had his earthly home, and friends, and work, and here today, we lay him where, within sight almost of that earthly home, the shadow of a Wicklow Church moves ever round the resting places of the dead as though in blessing and regret."

Mr Boyle had a poetic turn of phrase.
